# Summer Reading 2020 볼 Franklin Public Schools



The Franklin Public Schools' and Franklin Public Library's summer reading programs are designed to foster a joy of reading and serve as an opportunity to explore different literary genres. Participation is highly recommended but is optional this year due to the unusual circumstances in which we find ourselves. We know that the summer slide is inevitable, but it doesn't have to be. Reading will make a huge difference for students when they return to school in the fall after such

an extended period of school closure.

The common-sense notion that students who read for pleasure are more apt to demonstrate a positive attitude towards reading and increase their reading habit is upheld in both qualitative and quantitative research. Students who don't read lose an average of 2-3 months proficiency; over time, those lost months add up to years. By high school, two-thirds of the reading achievement gap can be attributed to summer learning loss during the elementary and middle school years.

Our single greatest responsibility is to grow readers. Reading increases background knowledge, vocabulary, writing skills, fluency, comprehension, and social-emotional skills such as empathy. We seek to both inform students of the value of reading and support parents in making reading a family expectation. - ★ Explore sites such as <u>Amazon</u>, <u>YALSA</u>, <u>Goodreads</u>, and <u>Common Sense Media</u> for lists and recommendations.
- ★ Utilize personal devices with apps such as <u>Libby</u>, <u>OverDrive</u>, and <u>Hoopla</u> (public library card is required)
- ★ Try audiobooks as a family. <u>Audible</u> continues to be free to stream this summer!
- ★ Review book choices for suitability for your reader (young adult literature can encompass mature topics)
- ★ Read TO and WITH children of ALL ages! Read the same book as your child and engage in discussion.
- ★ Encourage your child to select books of high interest. Allow them to try something different if they aren't enjoying a book.
- ★ Encourage children to explore different genres including poetry, nonfiction, and graphic novels.
- ★ Again, Jordan Sonnenblick will be visiting all three Franklin middle schools in November. Why not read one as a family?
