Greetings, Franklin Families and Residents!

**March Meeting Highlights** 

During the first meeting of the month, Superintendent Giguere shared his recommended **FY25 budget proposal**. The budget request for FY25 was for \$81.3 million (\$9.3M increase) to provide a Level Service + budget. The Level Services portion, which accounts for \$7.3M of the increase, is to keep the exact same services provided in FY24. The Plus portion, which is the remaining \$2M, is for salaries of 20.1 new employees to maintain acceptable class sizes, restore late bus service, and partially restore middle school clubs. The first **Joint Budget Subcommittee** meeting was on March 6th. Town Administrator Jamie Hellen presented a primer to the FY25 budget and Superintendent Giguere shared his recommended FY25 budget presentation. The full meeting is available <u>here</u>. The Town Administrator's proposed FY25 Town budget should be available for review around April 12th.

During the second School Committee meeting of the month, the School Committee received a budget review presentation from the Superintendent and then conducted a line-by-line **review of the proposed FPS FY25 expenses**. On the 26th, a special School Committee meeting was held for a presentation from Dr. Fran Locker, from Locker & Associates, about the **Portrait of a Graduate & Educational Visioning**. Dr. Locker expanded on the findings of the **Portrait of a Graduate Application Workshop and** the Visioning 2-day Workshop. There will be a feedback forum for Family & Community in the Franklin High School Cafeteria on April 8th at 6 PM.

## Franklin Student Program Highlight

The Franklin High School Theatre Company competed in the annual **METG High School Drama Festival**. Their one-act festival entry of Flowers for Algernon was featured in the preliminary and semi-final rounds, both of which were hosted by Franklin High School. The METG hosts this multi-round theatre festival in the month of March, where 114 schools compete to move on to future rounds. FHS was so fortunate to move on from the preliminary to the semi-final round this year. Over 70 students participated in facets of performing, technical work, and hosting responsibilities. Here are some words from Chloe about her Project 351 experience.



I was selected by my Social Studies teacher, Mr. Mello, as well as my principal, Ms. Morrison as the Project 351 ambassador for Franklin this year. Project 351 is "a program that seeks to develop the younger generation into service leaders in the community through customized service learning, hands-on community-building, and values-based leadership training." Educators select ambassadors from each of the 351 cities and towns in Massachusetts for their exemplary ethic of service and the values of kindness, compassion, humility, and gratitude.

# From the Subcommittee Chair

**Dave Callaghan** is the Chair of the **Comprehensive School Facilities Planning Subcommittee**. The subcommittee members include Al Charles & Erin Gallagher. The Comprehensive School Facilities Subcommittee aims to develop a long-term vision for Franklin students' education. To achieve this, they are focusing on three key areas:

- 1. **Demographics** Studying community demographics to understand population trends and enrollment forecasts over the next decade.
- 2. **Educational Facilities** Assessing existing educational facilities, including building lifespans, maintenance costs, educational adequacy, and optimal facility utilization.
- 3. **Educational Vision** Evaluating the current educational model as it relates to Franklin's Portrait of a Graduate, assessing its effectiveness, and ensuring educational adequacy and equity across the district.

Their objective is to produce a roadmap that guides the community in delivering the best education possible while maintaining fiscal responsibility. This roadmap can aid current and future School Committees in decision-making, addressing declining enrollment while accommodating potential population growth. By integrating these aspects, they aim to create a comprehensive educational plan for Franklin, depicting the present state and envisioning the future of education in the community.

The Superintendent presented an update on March 26th, providing historical context, actions completed, and next steps for this Subcommittee. # What Does the School Committee Do?

From the <u>Masc Roles and Responsibilities</u> website - "A School Committee must be responsive to its constituencies in governance, sensitive to the diverse needs of all learners, an advocate for students and learning before the people of the community and, as such, a vigorous ambassador for public education before all citizens.

Procedures, determined locally in each school system, should be reviewed annually to assure compliance with current policy.

Harmonious and productive relationships between school committees and superintendents will flourish if two-way communication is established and maintained. Such teamwork will work to enhance and improve the Commonwealth's schools, enriching the lives of all Massachusetts students."

One common misconception is that the School Committee is involved in the day-to-day operations of the school district. The School Committee is an oversight body that holds the Superintendent accountable to enforce policies and guidelines.

In the simplest form, the School Committee is responsible for three areas:

- 1. Hire and review the performance of the Superintendent
- 2. Develop school policy
- 3. Oversee the annual budget

The three areas can be expanded to include subcategories listed below:

Policy	Performance Standards	Curriculum
Finance	Professional Development	Governance
Staffing	School Councils	Communication
Collective Bargaining	Advocacy
