CURRICULUM

Students are allowed to select from a wide range of course offerings. Students may prepare for work in business or industry and for college simultaneously. Every attempt is made to meet the educational needs of the students in preparation for the post-secondary world.

Courses are offered according to four criteria: instructional pace, content, classroom activities, and assignments outside the classroom. These criteria must be considered when courses are selected:

•COLLEGE PREPARATORY (CP)

These courses include courses designed to prepare students to continue their education. They may require well-developed reading, writing, verbal, conceptual, mathematical, and study abilities, as well as substantial outside preparation.

•HONORS (H)

These courses offer highly challenging content, presented at an accelerated and more intensive pace than the typical college preparatory courses taken by a majority of four-year college-bound students.

They require advanced reading, writing, verbal, conceptual, and mathematical ability, as well as extensive outside preparation.

•ADVANCED PLACEMENT (AP)

These courses are formally recognized as Advanced Placement (AP) courses by the College Board. AP courses are college-level courses with standardized exams. These courses provide opportunities for students to earn advanced placement and/ or credit at college.

GRADE POINT AVG. (GPA) CALCULATION

Grade Point Average (GPA) is tabulated according to utilization of a 4 point weighting system. This system is consistent with the requirements of colleges and universities for the method of reporting student GPA for the application process and is in compliance with the Massachusetts Dept. of Higher Education guidelines for computing weighted grade point average. Courses at Franklin High School are grouped in three levels and will be given differing weights in the computation of grade point average according to the chart above.

RANK

Students are placed in one of ten deciles according to their weighted GPA. This weight is determined by the degree of the difficulty in each subject (weighted 4.0 scale).

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Of a 35 period, 7 day cycle, 30-35 class periods are required. Courses are offered on a semester and yearlong basis and receive 5.0 credits for a full year course and 2.5 for a semester course. One hundred and six and a half academic credits are required for graduation, including: English, 20 credits; Mathematics, 20 credits; Science, 15 credits (including 5 Biology credits); Social Studies, 15 credits (including 10 U.S. History credits); 10 credits in an elective sequence; Wellness 4.0 credits, 60 hours physical education (requirement may be obtained through an outside pathway)

SPECIALIZED PROGRAMS

●Franklin Arts Academy

The Franklin Arts Academy is a pathway within Franklin High School designed to give students with an interest in the performing and visual arts an opportunity to explore their area of passion. These academic classes are designed to deliver high quality standards fully integrating the arts with a process driven curriculum. The areas of art concentration are: Architecture, Musical Production, Theatre, Video Production and Visual Arts.

●Senior Project

As a participant in the Senior Project, students will increase their awareness of the necessary steps for achieving a set career, service, or artistic path by participating in a full-time externship during the final quarter of their senior year. Students will complete various project objectives including: 70 hours of professional externship experience, written reflection papers, a cumulative portfolio, and a final presentation to a panel. Students must submit a proposal for Senior Project by the end of their junior year. The proposal is reviewed by a panel who will determine if the Project has the potential to be completed successfully. Upon acceptance into the Senior Project, students will enroll in a preparatory course during the 3rd term of their senior year and then commence their externship during the final quarter of their senior year. Senior Project provides students with the opportunity to apply their academic, social, and civic skills developed throughout the course of their experiences at FHS and realize connections between their high school education and future careers.

SEAL of BILITERACY

MASSACHUSETTS STATE SEAL OF BILITERACY

The State Seal of Biliteracy is an award given to students who have attained a high level of proficiency in English through the ELA MCAS or ACCESS and another language through a district-selected standardized test. The qualifying student will demonstrate a high level of proficiency in all four domains of language (reading, writing, speaking and listening when all exist) of both languages. In Franklin,

qualifying seniors will receive an official state seal beginning with the graduating class of 2021. This program is designed to both motivate and recognize students who have pursued and attained biliteracy during their academic career in Franklin. This designation will be applied to Franklin High School transcripts for all qualifying students. Many of the students who matriculate through Franklin Public Schools graduate with functional literacy in two or more languages. The Seal of Biliteracy will benefit students in the workforce and our global society because it serves as evidence of the language skills that a student possesses to future employers and college admissions offices and will encourage students to cultivate their understanding of the complex, diverse and interdependent world in which we live.

FHS COVID Statement

Due to Massachusetts Governor Charles Baker's Executive Order dated March 15, 2020, which prohibited in-person instruction and educational operations until June 18, 2020, while schools were closed due to the Executive Order, Franklin High School adjusted grading practices in the following manner:

- Term three grades were closed effective March 13, 2020
- Term four grades were marked as either Pass or Not Pass. Student grades from term four (Pass/Not Pass) were not factored into a student's final numerical average unless students demonstrated significant increased mastery of skill/content. In those cases there was a three point maximum increase that teachers were empowered to raise the final average.
- No final exams were administered
- Student final averages were based on term grades earned during terms one through three only
- No changes were made to graduation requirements nor schedules and course offerings

Franklin High School began the school year 2020-2021 fully remote with a transition to optional hybrid learning in November 2020. There was an additional transition in April of 2021 to optional full in-person learning. During the school year 2020-21, grading policies were in keeping with those practices in place pre-COVID disruption.
