POLICY CHANGE

School Committee adopted a revised homework policy at the end last year which was designed to include consideration of:

- + The needs of the whole child and families
- + Be appropriate in time and frequency for each developmental stage
- + Be meaningful, relevant, and aligned with work in the classroom
- + Have a clearly articulated purpose, educational objective and learning expectations
- + Be personalized to meet the needs of the learner
- + Be structured to provide students with feedback that leads to improved learning
- + Be consistent, to a reasonable degree, across grade levels and among classrooms
- + Align with current research on best practice as well as school and District policies

 To ensure that all students are supported and challenged to reach their full potential, the Franklin Public Schools will align curriculum, best instructional practices, and varied assessment opportunities to personalize learning and meet individual needs.

DISTRICT IMPROVEMENT PLAN (DIP)

Strategic Objective:

 Create an educator/administrator study group to examine research and best practices with regard to homework and make recommendations for K–12 homework practices and alignment with Franklin School Committee policy.

 Develop presentation and forum for parents/guardians regarding possible changes to homework practices, grounded in research and best practices in the field.

Group membership-total of 26 including Dr. Edwards: Represents a cross-section of schools/grades/departments:

- Teachers across levels (5 Elementary, 4 Middle School, 6 High School, 1 Special Educator, 1 ELL, 1 Elementary Literacy, 1 MS Subject Coordinator, 1 FHS Department Head)
- Administrators (2 Elementary, 1 Middle School, 1 High School, 1 CO Special Education)
- <u>Group also represented a cross-section of homework beliefs</u> and current practices

Planned Outcomes:

- Develop recommendations regarding homework practices
 - Gather parent and student voice as part of the process
- SC review of policy to ensure match all the way around
- Parent forum about homework research and practices and any proposed/recommended changes

Initially:

- Discussed why the formation of a study group
- Set purpose of the group as the need for STUDY:
 - Current research and thinking about homework for all grades
 - Examine our personal beliefs and that of colleagues regarding homework
 - Identifying best practices within the research

Resources:

Read *Rethinking Homework by Cathy Vatterott* Many current articles with varying viewpoints

Currently:

- Identifying current practices in Franklin
- Will be developing surveys to secure input

Next Steps:

- Develop preliminary recommendations for any proposed changes to practice
- Seek input about proposed changes from all stakeholders
- Present findings to School Committee to ensure policy and practices align appropriately

Continued Next Steps:

- + Conduct family forums to educate the community about best practices in homework research and any proposed changes in Franklin
- + Multi-year process which will extend into next year
- + Cycle back into a timely review of any changes implemented to determine effectiveness and impacts on teaching and learning

Homework Survey Results December Results


- + Overwhelmingly positive response from
- + Large majority endorsed continuing vacation as homework free
- + FHS teachers had most concerns about losing time to advance curriculum yet almost 70% endorsed homework free vacations

Homework Survey Results February Results

- Survey data following similar themes, patterns, and trends as December vacation surveys
- + Many families indicated that vacation became less stressful and allowed students to relax
- Many participants (students, families, and teachers) thanked the district for this approach
