Emergency Busing

It is beginning to be the time of year when we implement emergency bus service. When the forecast calls for frigid temperatures, cold wind chills, and icy spots on roads and sidewalks, the Franklin Public Schools often utilizes **emergency busing**. Students who do not normally ride the bus who are walking or waiting along the route will be picked up by our drivers.

In the afternoon, if emergency busing is in effect, families can call the office and arrange with the administration for a bus ride.

Report from MASC/MASS Joint Conference, November 6-9, 2019

Last week, I attended the Massachusetts Association of School Committees and Massachusetts Association of School Superintendents' Joint Conference on Education. There were keynote speeches on both Thursday and Friday, as well as numerous breakout sessions. Additionally, I attended the annual MASS business meeting.

The keynotes included:

- Norman Ornstein, Political Scientist and Resident Scholar at American Enterprise Institute. His remarks reflected on making policy amid a tumultuous political climate.
- 2. Derrick Gay, Diversity Consultant, who remarked on reframing diversity for the 21st century.

The breakout sessions I attended included:

- 1. Strong Communities/Strong Public Schools: Time to Start the Dialogue -- the focus was on supporting students' SEL needs with community based "wraparound" services
- 2. Student Health and Wellness: Combating E-Cigarettes and Vaping -- the focus was to learn from a fellow district about their comprehensive SEL and wellness initiatives
- 3. Compelling Communication: How to Strengthen Your District's "Brand" in the Community -- the focus was on strategic communication; he validated our work in this area and provided me with additional ideas for 2020-2021

- 4. Achievable Energy Savings, Facility Upgrades, and Renewable Incentives and Student Enrichment -- we learned how one district partnered with Trane, Inc. to implement solar carports, a biomass boiler, LED lighting, and other improvements while reducing utility spending.
- 5. Lessons from Dedham -- the focus was on understanding more about the recent strike in that community.
- 6. Stories of Personalized Learning Change and Challenge in MAPLE Districts -- the Massachusetts Personalized Learning Edtech Consortium hosted four catalyst districts, who shared their approach and strategies to implementing personalized learning in their districts. We joined MAPLE in 2018 as a member.
- 7. Evaluating the Superintendent -- New and Improved. A MASC field director led this session where Dr. Bergen and I sat on a panel and shared Franklin's approach to supervision and evaluation of the Superintendent.

Professional Status Reception

Every fall, we recognize the milestone of achieving Professional Status for our educators. Professional Status is awarded to teachers/counselors and other professionals in that bargaining unit, after three full successful years of employment in the district.

We note it with a reception to celebrate their achievement, as the bar to attain PTS is a high one. Within the first three years, these educators must complete a mentoring and induction program and they are supervised and evaluated annually on Developing Educator Plans under the careful direction of their building administrators. And while we support them, they must demonstrate that they meet our high expectations.

This year 30 educators are receiving professional status and we invite our School Committee members to join us on Monday, November 18 at 3:30 PM in the high school library. A follow up e-mail will follow.
